The Rev. Kristie L. Olah, District Superintendent for the El Camino Real District and Dean of the Cabinet, has announced her intention to retire on September 1. Her retirement will be recognized at this year's Annual Conference Session.

Bishop Warner H. Brown, Jr. said, "Kristie has given outstanding leadership as a District Superintendent and as Dean of the Cabinet. She has led the development of the El Camino Real District." He added, "Under her leadership, numerous new congregations and new language ministries have been developed."

Olah began serving as a District Superintendent under Bishop Beverly J. Shamana in July of 2008 in the former San Jose District. As the annual conference restructured and new districts were formed, Olah became the first District Superintendent of the El Camino Real District.

Olah says, "I have felt deeply called into the ministry of superintendency."

Olah says there are joys and challenges in supervising the 88 diverse congregations that make up the El Camino Real District. "I am passionate about helping each faith community, in its own unique context, to prayerfully seek out and live God's call to be disciples and invited others into a life of grace and hope through Jesus Christ," she said.

Olah says she has been inspired and honored to serve with an excellent Cabinet team of superintendents and with Bishop Brown. "I love the relationships I have built with them and with leaders and pastors in so many churches. What a blessing to serve among them all. They have called me deep into my own faith," she added.

"As I enter the retired relationship, I look forward to continuing to serve in ministry as a volunteer, especially in the areas of leadership development, discipleship, and consulting with local churches.

Prior to serving as a District Superintendent, Olah pastored St. Andrew's United Methodist Church in Palo Alto, was Minister of Discipleship at Los Altos United Methodist Church, and Senior Pastor of the Good Samaritan United Methodist Church in Cupertino.

Olah, who was born in New Jersey and raised in La Crosse, Wisconsin, earned a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and a Master of Divinity from Pacific School of Religion (PSR) in Berkeley.

She is a lifelong Methodist and was an active layperson for nearly 20 years before answering a call to ordained ministry.

Olah, who resides in Sunnyvale, is married to Robert Olah, a semiconductor design engineer, and they have three adult children and four grandsons.



Bishop Warner H. Brown, Jr., has named the Rev. Staci Current to be the next District Superintendent for the El Camino Real District. Current, who will assume the post September 1, 2015, will succeed the Rev. Kristie L. Olah who has served in this capacity for 7 years.

Bishop Brown says, "Staci Current is a dynamic and passionate leader. She will be an excellent successor to Kristie Olah. Both of them share a passion and energy for ministry with the multi-ethnic communities of this diverse district."

Current is a native Californian born in Hollywood and reared in the Los Angeles suburb of Cerritos.

"I am very excited to be in ministry with the people of God in The El Camino Real district! I am confident that we will continue the great kingdom work that has already begun as we grow into a bright future together," said Current.

Current earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political Science and International Relations from Spelman College in Atlanta, Georgia. She is a 1998 graduate of Claremont School of Theology (CST) earning a Master of Divinity Degree. Since 2009, Current has been the pastor of Jones Memorial United Methodist Church in San Francisco and was sworn in as Chaplain for the San Francisco Police Department in 2011. She has also held pastorates in the North Georgia and Pacific Northwest Annual Conferences. Prior to Jones Memorial, she was the pastor of Oakland's Shattuck Avenue United Methodist Church.

Beyond the local church, Current serves on the Faith Advisory Board of the Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center at University of California, San Francisco, a mentor for five candidates for ordained ministry, and served as the Chairperson for the California-Nevada Annual Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women.

Current is passionate about preaching God's word and seeing lives transformed by the healing, empowering Gospel of Jesus Christ. She has preached church revivals, consecration Sundays, and led numerous retreats for the United Methodist Women (UMW) and various other groups across the country.

Current is married to the Rev. John D. Current, Sr., who is the pastor of Grace United Methodist Church in San Francisco and they are the parents of 15-year-old Leon "Leo" Current. She has two bonus children, John Current, Jr., and Faith Anderson, and bonus grandson, David.

In March the children's Sunday School Class began learning about Passover and what happened to Jesus and his disciples during the week from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday. Rebecca Frost and Kilo Leaaetooa are helping in this class.

The youth group will stuff plastic eggs after worship on Palm Sunday, and will come early on Easter Sunday to hide them on the front lawn. They will also help the smaller children find eggs, as needed.



Egg-stra facts

- Although Easter eggs were once part of pagan spring festivals, they've become Christian symbols of new life. A cracked-open shell also represents Jesus' empty tomb on Easter morning.
- The early Christians of Mesopotamia began staining eggs red in honor of Jesus' blood shed on the cross. Red eggs remain part of Greek Orthodox celebrations today.
- For Lent, some families used to give up eggs and dairy, so they prepared a pancake feast on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday. They solved the egg surplus by hard-boiling them in various broths, which led to colored eggs.
- In medieval times, churches held "egg-throwing" festivals. The priest threw a hard-boiled egg toward the choir boys, who tossed it back and forth. When the clock struck 12, whoever was holding the egg got to keep it.
- In some European countries, children go from house to house to collect Easter eggs.
- Each year, the PAAS Dye Co. sells more than 10 million egg-coloring kits, which consumers use to decorate 180 million eggs.
- The tallest chocolate Easter egg ever produced weighed 16,000 pounds – more than an elephant!
